England vs Scotland

Our first sporran guide was around unchartered territories as we faced Slovakia for the first time, this is the polar opposite as we are very familiar with our next opponents. This will be the 112th official fixture against our oldest rivals England.

It is however the first time the countries have been drawn together in world cup qualification (Home Internationals in 1950 and 1954 were used for qualification) as we bid to get our campaign for Russia 2018 back on track.

Both countries have not had their problems to seek recently although managerless England have still picked up 7 points to lead group F, we only have 4 and need a big result to put us back into contention for qualification.

Getting There

There are six major airports Heathrow, Gatwick, Luton, City, Stansted and Southend that are all wel connected to central London. Trains from Scotland travel throughout the day and arrive at either Euston or Kings Cross stations.

The biannual trip to Wembley Stadium was legendary for many Scots for years. Fans would descend on London in huge numbers and would find as many ways to get there as you could possibly imagine. So you don't really need us to tell you

Getting Around London

The simplest method of getting around on London transport is either to buy an Oyster card or use your own contactless credit or debit card. Both are accepted on bus, tube, tram, DLR, London Overground, TfL Rail, Emirates Air Line, River Bus and most National Rail services in London. They represent major savings on traditional single paper tickets which should be avoided at all costs.

Both Oyster and contactless methods offer daily capping which means you can have unlimited travel all day and the total you are charged will be limited. For zones 1-2 the cap is £6.50 and for zones 1-4 (which include all three Wembley stations) it will be capped at £9.30 - compared to a paper day travelcard which would be £12.10 for either. Just remember to touch in and out at every tube or rail station (but only on entry on a bus). See www.ffl.gov.uk.

Armistice Day and Trafalgar Square

Scotland fans make every effort to respect local customs and traditions on their travels and this will continue when they play England on 11th November. Many Scotland fans will be keen to visit Trafalgar Square, and it is expected that this will be done sensitively to complement the remembrance ceremonies that will be taking place that day.

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PUB CRAWL

Our friends in the Lunnainn Albannaich Tartan Army have recommended a few pubs on the south bankto frequent on the Saturday afternoon.

The south bank of the Thames has a veritable abundance of attractions where you can eat and drink your way around the globe whilst taking in some of the best of what London has to offer.

If we start off at the **Horniman At Hays** bar right next to HMS Belfast. Closest tube is London Bridge on the Jubilee and Northern line. You can watch the world go by on both the river and the pathway, just watch out for the joggers.

Ignore all the eating options in the surrounding environs as **Borough Market** is less than 300 yards away. Start walking west, with the river on your right hand side. You should be able to keep walking until you come to London Bridge where you can go up and over or try walking below it. As you go underneath, on your right hand side you will see the **Mug House**, a bar built in to the structure of the bridge itself. If you go over make sure to look up to view the Shard. Anyone with £25 to spare can book a ticket to go right to the top. Anyone with £125 to spare can have a Chinese meal in Hutong.

Keep walking till you have Southwark Cathedral on your left. Walk round the cathedral via Cathedral Street and you will find yourself in the heart of the market. All culinary life is here. You should be able to eat from Argentina to Ethiopia in either the permanent stalls or the pop up stalls. Don't leap in straightaway but have a wander around to see what you fancy. It's all good.

This area is also popular with film makers and you should be able to see the door from Bridget Jones' flat next to the **Globe Tavern** on Bedale Street, the office from Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels on Park Street and as you walk further round by the Thames, the riverside scene from the end of the first Mission Impossible (**The Anchor** pub) and the building that featured in an Only Fools and Horses Christmas special.

Once you have exhausted the market of what it has to offer, for any real ale fans the **Market Porter** on the corner of Stoney Street and Park Street should not be missed. Another bar with an even more eclectic selection of beers in the Borough Market area is the **The Rake** on Winchester Walk which boasts that it only sells real and craft beer on tap.

Other good pubs around the market include the **Southwark Tavern** and **Katzenjammers**, a proper German bar underneath the Hop Exchange on Southwark Street. Neighbouring bar **The Sheaf** shows live football and has a good selection of Real Ales and bar food.

Anyway, try to get back on to Stoney Street and head back towards the river. When you come to Clink Street, the site of the notorious prison, turn right to see a life size replica of the Golden Hinde. There is a pub next to it called the **Thameside Inn** where you can sit outside with the river immediately below you. Service can be slow in here as it can in the next pub, the **Anchor** (this is where Mission Impossible ended – as mentioned before) though there is a large outdoor area here if it's not too cold and it gives you wider view of the river and St Pauls.



Once past the bridge you are coming up to three of the major attractions on the walk. The Globe Theatre, Tate Modern and the Millennium Bridge. If you can be bothered to work your way through the tourists, for fantastic views of St Paul's and the London Skyline, go up to the 6th floor of the Tate Turbine hall or the 10th floor viewing platform on the newly opened Switch House extention where you can also spot Wembley Stadium. There are several café bars at the Tate where you can have a drink and a bite to eat but another option is to continue walking to the **Founders Arms**, another pub right on the river.

Carry on walking past Blackfriars Bridge. And you come to another pub called the **Doggett's Coat and Badge** where you sit outside or go inside if it's getting a bit nippy. Any boxing fans may want to leave the river at this point and head down Blackfriars Road to the Cut where you will find a pub called **The Ring**, across the road from Southwark tube station. This pub has a vast collection of boxing memorabilia and an actual ring in the room above the pub.

If you continue along the river however you then come to Gabriel's Wharf which is to be avoided at all costs as it's a complete rip off. Head into the Southbank Centre and browse the second hand bookstalls. There may be pop up bars and eating places on the Southbank although the centre itself has reasonable bars and there are the standard midrange chains available.

Keep on walking past the famous skate park and Royal Festival Hall until you find yourself on the Queen's Walk and you should have the London Eye right in front of you. Having seen this masterpiece of British engineering, you can then cross the Golden Jubilee Bridge adjacent to the railway and cross over to the Embankment where you can walk up to Trafalgar Square and the West End or hang about locally where there are a couple of interesting bars.

Just behind the Southbank centre is Roupell Street, a fascinating row of nineteenth-century workers' cottages with an excellent pub at one end called the Kings Arms which does Thai food. If you don't fancy that, head down to the Cut which houses both the Old Vic and the Young Vic theatres. There is also an excellent pub called the Anchor and Hope which does off the wall British dishes and it's all very informal. If you fancy doing some people watching, go to the terrace bar on the first floor of the Young Vic where you can sit outside and watch the world go past in the street below. No ticket required and reasonable London prices. Food is also available.

If you decide to head back to Waterloo at this point pop into the **Fire Station** for a drink. It's a converted Edwardian fire station which sadly has undergone some modernisation lately which detracts slightly from the pub but the exterior is still close enough to the old station house to let you see what it would have been like in its heyday.



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THINGS TO DO

Football on the Saturday

Welcome to the world capital of football. With 38 teams in the top eight levels from Premiership to Isthmian League, and many more in the four leagues operating at level nine, there is rarely a day in any week that fans of football in London are deprived of a game to watch.

If you are staying on for the weekend in London after the England match, there are many options for a Saturday game even with the top two leagues out of action for the international break. Here are some top tips:

In the National League (i.e. the league formally known as the Conference) there are two very tempting games featuring giants of the south London non-league scene. Take your pick between **Bromley v Boreham Wood** at Hayes Lane or **Sutton United v Barrow** at Gander Green Lane. Both clubs play in fabulous old-fashioned football grounds with open terraces and friendly club-houses. You might recall Gander Green Lane as the scene of a legendary FA Cup 3rd round upset in 1989 when Sutton beat Coventry in front of 8,000 spectators. While the stadium has seen some redevelopment in the intervening years, the original character is intact. Expect crowds of over 1,000 at both games.

You might want to consider a trip to Champion Hill to see Dulwich Hamlet v Chesham United, although this is an FA Trophy tie for the best supported team in the Ryman Premier. Dulwich have a recently acquired hipster following which is not to everyone's taste, but that does mean there will probably be over 2,000 for this game and you shouldn't turn up late as the queues are usually dreadful. Warning – FA rules mean there is an alcohol ban on the terraces.

In the Ryman League South the pick of the London fixtures is Greenwich Borough v Carshalton Athletic. Borough are yet another travelling team recently settled in a new home which has resulted in a major spike in support, attracting average crowds of (hold onto your hat) 200 to the DGS Marine Stadium in Eltham (which, as I'm sure you know, is the birthplace of Bob Hope). You can have a pint or two watching the match - civilisation!

If you feel you need the throbbing atmosphere of a bigger stadium to celebrate Scotland's glorious victory at Wembley, then why not head to the Den for Millwall v Bristol Rovers? While the reputation of the Den is somewhat exaggerated these days (certainly for most matches) you may wish to tone down your Scottish accent (if you have one) as it is fair to say there will be a few geezers not too keen to see you – but what's life without taking a risk or two?

The match is a complete sell out.

Flags and Musical Instruments

If you have a Musical Instrument or a flag larger than 250cm (at the widest or longest point) or with a flag pole longer than 1m in length you must seek approval from Wembley Stadium via help.wembleystadium.com/support/home

All approved instruments must also be taken to B2 security entrance prior to 19.15 on match day at Wembley to gain entry, where they will be searched.
